Alumna Needs Kidney

Antioch received a special request from Julie Panneton, a 2000 graduate with an MA in Psychology (MHC), that we felt we needed to share with you.

Dear Alumni:

Some of you are aware that I have had lupus and kidney disease for the past 20 years. My current situation requires me to go to the extent of writing this letter.

Both of my kidneys have deteriorated to the point where they are functioning at less than 10% of normal resulting in end stage renal disease. Therefore, I now require dialysis and a kidney transplant.

This is my reality: The waiting list in the province of British Columbia is over 500 people for a kidney transplant. The projected waiting time for a cadaveric kidney transplant is 4 to 9 years. My kidney specialist believes that this is too long a time for me to be on dialysis waiting for a possible cadaver. His recommendation and my wish is to seek a live donor.

Normally humans are born with two kidneys. Since one healthy kidney has the ability to do the work of two and given the decreasing availability of cadaver kidney donors, a live donor kidney transplant is the preferred option for kidney failure.

The blood types of my two sisters, Jo-Ann and Cindy, unfortunately, do not match mine and my parents are too old for the procedure. Therefore, I must go beyond my immediate family for a donor. And a donor does not have to be a blood relative.

Initially, the type of donor I require needs to be an "O" blood type and willing to have a telephone interview with Pre-Transplant Clinic. As is the proper protocol, you must first contact me and I will then put you in touch with the hospital. For information, you may contact me at 604-649-4131 or jpann@uniserve.com.

Candace Harris, B.A. program: I’ve been reading a great book titled “Ideas of Heaven” by Joan Silber. It’s a short story collection but the individual stories, though they could stand alone, interpenetrate each other when a character, place or event in one story appears in the next.

It’s a loving look at the Charles White, one of the most distinguished and best known artists of the twentieth century, and a marriage between two people of different races who loved each enough to face a world not quite ready for such a union.

Ed Mikel, education: Here are two books I found timely and enlightening. “After the Empire: the Breakdown of the American Order” by C. Jon Delogu, who argues that the U.S. is not only not on the verge of world domination, but that American power is actually declining in a

number of critical ways. The second book is “In Praise of Slowness: How a Worldwide Movement is Challenging the Cult of Speed” by Carl Honore. The author discusses how the “current infatuation with speed” is inefficient, reduces value, is destructive of relationships and community and promotes fear.

Susan Starbuck, education: novels by James Welch, including “Winter in the Blood,” “The Death of Jim Loney,” “Killing Custer,” “Riding the Earthboy 40 (poems),” “Indian Lawyer,” and the “Hearsong of Charging Elk.” In each book, Welch’s voice and craft take you inside the most horrifying brutality and bring you out again with an understanding of our common humanity.
