## New Psy.D. Program Set to Accept Students for Fall 2004

Antioch University Seattle is proud to announce that its Board of Trustees has approved the addition of a doctoral program in clinical psychology to its Center for Graduate Programs in Psychology. The Psy.D. in Clinical Psychology Program hopes to accept students for Fall 2004, pending final authorization by the Washington State Higher Education Coordinating Board.

The Psy.D. program offers four areas of concentration: art therapy, family systems, psychodynamic and humanistic-existential. Its art therapy concentration, which would lead to Registered Art Therapist status as well as to the Doctor of Psychology degree, is expected to be the first such program available in the United States.

Students have the flexibility to pursue full-time or part-time study. (The program will take four years to complete for a full-

time student.) Practical experiences are integrated throughout the curriculum, including a one-year internship. The program also offers the flexibility to choose an applications-oriented doctoral paper or research dissertation.

Students seeking admission for the fall quarter should apply by Feb. 25. (The \$50 application fee is waived for Antioch alumni.)

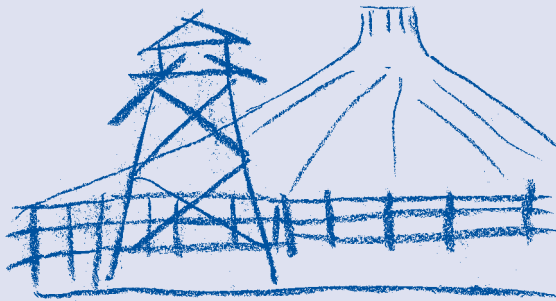

## Art Therapy Program Receives National Recognition

The American Art Therapy Association (AATA) Education Program Approval Board (EPAB) has awarded Antioch University Seattle's Art Therapy Program its highest approval, making it one of only 29 approved programs in the United States.

With this approval, students need to complete only 1,000 post-master's hours to become a registered art therapist (ATR).

In addition, Antioch's Art Therapy Program received the AATA's Pearlle Roberson Award, which recognizes outstanding work in the field of multiculturalism, for the documentary "Visual Memories: Japanese American Internment." Program chair Janice Hoshino and art therapy students Rachel Lordkenaga, Sharon Sanborn and Karn Scherfenberg collaborated on the project in which they

interviewed Japanese Americans who were placed in internment camps during WWII.

"We interviewed each of them separately and asked them to draw pictures. We were amazed by how similar their experiences were and how vivid their memories are 60 years later," Hoshino said. She also noted that the drawings they produced for the project took them to a much more emotional place than the interviews.

with cerebral palsy, she hopes to become a therapist who counsels adolescents coping with physical disabilities.

In her scholarship essay, she wrote: "Ultimately, disabled individuals will teach others, indirectly or directly, what it is like to have a disability. If we, as individuals, can eliminate shame and embarrassment associated with disabilities, we can eliminate this shame on a global scale by setting an example to others."

As alumni, I hope you join me in wishing Amanda the best as she pursues her degree. I also hope you will help us build the scholarship endowment so that Antioch can continue to grow and add value to your degree.

In June, the national Board of Trustees will meet on the Seattle campus and I'll take enormous pride in showing them around and sharing the accomplishments of our programs and the success stories of our alumni.

If you have not had the opportunity to visit the campus since we have undergone the August remodel, I encourage you to take the time to stop by. The building has such a warm and welcoming feeling to it, especially with the new art work.

## Horace Mann Awards Celebrate Victories for Humanity

To mark the 150th anniversary of Horace Mann's inauguration as Antioch's first president, Antioch University Seattle created the Horace Mann Awards.

Each year AUS will honor two individuals who have won significant victories for humanity through their work or volunteerism by presenting them with a Horace Mann Award. One award will be given to a member of Antioch's alumni. The other will be given to someone in the community who shares the same values as Horace Mann and Antioch: a commitment to promote social justice, community engagement or lifelong learning.

For 2003, Antioch named attorney and civil rights activist Ken MacDonald and documentary filmmaker and children's rights advocate Oliver Tuthill as Horace Mann Award winners.

The two received their awards at a special reception on Nov. 2. The event, which benefited the scholarship endowment, drew a capacity crowd that filled the second tier balcony of Marion Oliver McCaw Hall.

## Dan Soloff, Beloved Faculty Member, Passes Away

Dan Soloff, core faculty member of the B.A. in Liberal Studies Program, passed away July 27 from lung cancer.

Soloff came to Antioch University Seattle in 1980 after completing his Ph.D. in history at the University of Chicago. He taught at Antioch for 12 years and touched the lives of many students. Through his teaching and advising, many developed an excitement about history, cultural studies and other topics that he brought alive through dialogue and inquiry.

Teaching was Soloff's calling. He loved working with adult students who were entering a transitional time in their lives, and it was not uncommon to hear students describe him as their favorite teacher.

In his honor, Antioch has established the Dan Soloff Memorial Scholarship to award scholarships to undergraduate students with unmet financial need. To date, Antioch has raised \$4,468 toward the \$5,000 goal.
