## Arnie Tucker: Winning Victories for Humanity

**A**rne Tucker has a passion for pianos and helping others find the joy of music.

Tucker, B.A. '97, started Seattle Piano Gallery almost three years ago with the help of three piano-playing friends and technicians. "We noticed that there was a need to buy, sell, consign and restore great old pianos. Now we have 12 employees. We sold 174 used, restored pianos last year and completely restored or refinished 27 more for private customers in our large showroom and well-equipped shop not far from the Antioch campus."

Another interesting part of Tucker's story is his connection to Africa. "We noticed that about every 10<sup>th</sup> home in America has an old upright piano in the basement that isn't being used, so we've arranged to gather these up and ship many of them to Kenya.

There they strip, refinish and rebuild these fine old pianos and sell them for profit." This effort helps to support 10 families in Africa and has a positive ripple down effect in the neighborhood. To date, Seattle Piano Gallery has sent three container loads, or more than 70 pianos, to Africa.

"Our head piano technician spent five years in Kenya training to be an Olympic runner. He supported himself by tuning and repairing pianos and, in the process, trained local Kenyans to help him. They still have a business in Nairobi, which is the only piano dealer in all of East Africa."

Tucker also has put together some music-loving investors to buy new Japanese pianos and loan them to Seattle public schools. One of the original core faculty members at Antioch Seattle, Dan helped develop the curriculum for the psychology program. He was known as a caring mental health professional, passionate social activist and community leader. During his many years

at Antioch, from the late '70s to the late '90s, he taught and influenced many students and future psychologists.

Recently, I was preparing to testify before the Washington State Finance Housing Committee as part of a routine hearing to refinance the university's bonds. One question asked was to describe any special outreach programs that are directed to low-income, ethnic minorities and other underrepresented populations.

As I began to describe the various projects, I reflected on the role of the institution in community engagement and our desire to not only induce students to be change agents but to invoke the institution as a change agent for education.

The creation of our B.A. in Liberal Arts degree with teacher preparation introduced a targeted effort to enable paraprofessionals in the public schools, 85 percent who are people of color, to complete their undergraduate degree and obtain their teacher certification. As most of you know, Antioch University Seattle received \$3 million from the Gates Foundation over the last three years to create Early College educational models for Washington state high schools that predominately serve Native American students.

Because of the success of our seven Washington Early Colleges in increasing retention and graduation rates of Native American students, we received an additional \$6.1 million from the Gates Foundation to establish 10 to 12 Native American Early Colleges throughout the United

States. Additionally, our education center also runs a blended model of education programs on the Muckleshoot Reservation, which has increased access and retention.

Although we regretted the loss of the FareStart partnership, we were delighted to find other partners that aligned with our values and mission, the Friends of Youth and Tully's Coffee. In addition, some of our BA faculty initiated the Homeless Women's Project that provided breakfast and workshops every Thursday morning to downtown homeless women.

Our most recent outreach project is the mental health clinic sponsored by our psychology center. Graduate students enrolled in the clinical master's and doctoral programs will provide counseling services to various populations in Seattle and the Belltown community. Having a mental health clinic attached to our psychology program will significantly strengthen the mission of Antioch while providing an important means for our clinical students to experience one of this institution's most strongly-held pedagogical values - the integration of theory and practice.

I hope that in reflecting on our more recent outreach efforts, your reaction is similar to mine; that of pride and respect for our faculty, staff, students and alumni for their commitment to Antioch values and education. As we move toward the end of our year, which culminates at commencement on Sunday, June 12, think about attending and witnessing another group of students making the transition from student to alum and share the joy of being an Antiochian. ## Principal Preparation Program Offered Again This August

If you are a teacher ready to move your career forward, are passionate about diversity and want to integrate sustainable change at your school, consider Antioch's Principal Preparation program.

Three elements that make Antioch's program unique are: a commitment to multicultural competence, an internship that includes a community module, and a convenient monthly weekend format that makes it easy to continue working. Like all Antioch programs, this curriculum connects practice and theory. Plus, you can tailor the internship – which may be integrated throughout the program – and capstone research project to focus on your goals and key areas of interest.

If you already have your master's degree, you can prepare for your principal certificate by taking 37 quarter credits. Or, you can build it into a 48-credit master's degree in Education. Either option can be completed in 18 months, if attending full-time. Or you also can attend part-time, if you prefer.

"I really liked the fact that Antioch's class schedule fit my busy life and allowed me to work and go to school," said **Wayne Floyd**, assistant principal at Seattle's Cleveland High School. "Plus the topics discussed in the principal preparation program were relevant to real life situations and gave me information I could use immediately."

Floyd also liked the fact that the other students in his Antioch cohort group were kid-centered and provided a great support group for brain-storming and collaborating on projects. Floyd suggests if you know a colleague who may be interested – a certified teacher, counselor or librarian with at least three years experience – refer them to Antioch.
