After nine years at Antioch University Seattle, Toni Murdock has become the University Chancellor, the first woman in the history of Antioch's six campus system and one of the few women chancellors throughout the country. This is a tremendous accomplishment for Toni and Antioch Seattle. I feel honored to have been asked to lead

AUS as interim president at this important time, and to assist in preparing the campus for a new president.

IRA Rollover Provision Provides Incentive for Charitable Distributions of Assets

The IRA rollover provision signed into law Aug. 17 provides tax incentives for donors age 70½ or older to contribute individual retirement account assets to educational institutions and other nonprofits without having to cash out the IRA and treat the proceeds as income.

The provision allows donors to exclude from adjusted gross income the amount of "qualified charitable distributions" up to \$100,000 per year from regular or Roth IRAs. Further, the IRA rollover allows donors who do not itemize deductions to contribute IRA assets to charities and enjoy tax benefits similar to those derived from claiming itemized charitable deductions. The provision expires Dec. 31, 2007.
